I would also like to mention that Flamingo Court was our first production where we contributed \$1,000.00 to a local 501c3 non-profit. Our Board agreed unanimously to present \$1,000.00 at the first performance of each of our three mainstage productions to a worthy, area non-profit to show our community involvement. The first non-profit that we contributed to was Chief Mike Bardell for the SCC Emergency Squad. We received a very nice thank you from them as well as some very nice feedback for our contribution.

Tickets are on sale now at the Kings Point Box Office from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m., Monday-Friday. Evening performances are \$16; \$13 for matinees. Tickets will also be sold at the door for each show; we accept only checks or cash (exact amounts are appreciated).

All performances are at the Kings Point Veterans Theater in the North <u>Clubhouse</u>, 1900 <u>Clubhouse Drive</u>, in Sun City Center.

A NEW ALLIANCE By: Diane Keyes

The Pelican Players Community Theater and The Literacy Alliance are joining forces to provide a monthly Pre-K Storytime program called **Building Blocks for Literacy** for six or seven local Pre-K programs for the next school year.

Pelican Players will provide the volunteers. Auditions will be held this summer. Six or seven teams of two will be selected and trained to provide programs designed by an experienced children's librarian. Each team of 2 volunteers will learn one program that is unique to them. They will provide their program to 6 or 7 different Pre-K locations. Each month they will visit a different location over the 2024-25 school year. The program will be designed for one or two presenters. This will give each team flexibility. If one member can't make a program date, the other will be able to provide the program on their own. All materials are provided. However, gas to and from the location will not be provided.

Literacy Alliance will provide training, program scheduling, and materials for all programs.

Program name - Building Blocks for Literacy

Program Description - The purpose of this 30-minute program is to encourage young children to connect with books, to be curious about their world, and to embrace their desire to learn. Children will laugh and learn in this program which includes a selection of the following: age-appropriate fiction and nonfiction books, puppets, audience participation, a science experiment, and music.

Research shows that an early association with books stimulates children's interests, emotional development, language development, and imagination. The benefits of listening to stories and sharing books with children includes learning sounds for letters, developing thinking abilities, comprehending stories, understanding complex sentences, and learning new words and meanings.

Pre-K locations - yet to be determined. (The goal would be to have locations less than 30 minutes driving time from Sun City Center)


THE WHOLE TOWN'S SLEEPING NOW ON YOUTUBE

One of our members who moved to Michigan, and who we continue to adore, Mary McClafferty, saw the play and suggested that we take a look at it.



PUTTING SOME FUN IN FUNDRAISING



When I started surfing the web, after speaking on the phone with Helen DePinto, the Events Chair volunteer with Campaign Against Human Trafficking-Southshore, I started reading and learning about this organization. I had heard about it but never took the time to understand and comprehend their ties and contributions to our community.

According to worldpopulationreview.com Florida ranks as the third highest state for human trafficking cases and second for labor trafficking cases. There are 4.08 cases per 100,000 people in this jurisdiction.

Campaign Against Human Trafficking-Southshore raises money to help mobilize and inspire people to step up and help put an end to the <u>unlawful</u> act of <u>transporting</u> or <u>coercing</u> people in order to benefit from their work or service, typically in the form of forced labor or sexual exploitation.

On Saturday, September 21st, we will be performing *Cirque de la Morte Murder Mystery*, as a fundraiser for Campaign Against Human Trafficking-Southshore, at the Community Hall in Sun City Center. 



IN HER OWN WORDS - MARY BANASZAK

Where are you from?

I was born Mary Kathleen Gallagher in Chicago and grew up in the suburb Cicero.



What are you job experiences? After graduating from high school, I started working as a secretary for engineers with my favorite job at Concrete Reinforcing Steel Institute. I also attended night school receiving an Associate Degree in 1967. In my 30s I got my B. A. in Business Administration and a Master's Degree in Special Education. These degrees enabled me to teach Special Ed.in three states (California, Alabama, and Illinois) for over 33 years. The last of those 8 years I became an Educational Diagnostician at West Aurora High School in Aurora, Illinois. This job required me to do academic testing and report writing of the special education students at the high school. It was a job I loved and a wonderful working environment.

What was your favorite life experience? When I was 17 and Ronald was 18, we met on a blind date 62 years ago on Saturday, July 7, 1962. (On that day fate brought "Home Delivery" of both a boyfriend and a husband.) We had a great time bowling. I hoped for a second date, but he never called because he went on a trip to Washington D. C. I am grateful for the Chicago L system for reuniting us on the same L train in rush hour traffic. He did get off at my stop so we could reconnect. August 12, 1967, we had a traditional Chicago Polish wedding. This was after five years of dating, Ron completing college and teaching for a year. Our marriage has brought us four loving children and 13 grandchildren. Together we have made life-changing decisions which had us living and working in Stockton and Benicia, California, Tuscaloosa, Alabama, back to Chicago and the suburbs and retiring to Sun City Center. We travelled together to places I never thought possible like through the Panama Canal, Suez Canal and Petra.

When and how did you find out about The Pelican Players? Ron's acting talents were discovered when he took an acting class and was invited to join Pelican Players. We both joined and he started acting.

What is your experience with The Pelican Players and what is your favorite thing about belonging to this group? I started as a silent observer. Then at an annual membership meeting I volunteered when Mary Winter, Shirley Walker and Joy Dunn asked for a volunteer to put up posters in Sun City Center. That responsibility grew to sending publicity to the newspapers, working on the playbill, and producing several plays. I loved being taught new skills on the computer by Ken Winter. He was always so patient and believed in me.

What is your favorite thing about belonging to this group? First, I am grateful for Pelican Players for giving me a new purpose at this phase in my life. It is a great place to be around exciting, talented people. This makes me want to share and promote our plays and talented members with others. We have so much to offer. When I meet someone new, I do the old sales routine, "What are your interests?" I then ask if they like going to plays. If they show an interest in plays, I introduce them to Pelican Players either through the website, our business card or a current flier. Pelican Players gives people an opportunity to share all their talents and creativity while building a stronger club. There is something for everyone.

IN HIS OWN WORDS - DAN TACKITT

Where are you from?

I was born in Northern Indiana where I spent the first 18 years of my life.

What are your job experiences?

I graduated from high school in 1963 and joined the US Air Force the same year. I was stationed in Texas, Mississippi, Taipei, Taiwan, Hawaii, Eglin AFB, and Fort Walton Beach, FL. I met my wife, Mary in 1966 and we married in July of 1967. I was discharged in September 1967 and started junior college in January 1968. We were living in Fort Walton Beach at this time. I finished junior college May 1969 and Mary, who had been working for the Air Force, got a job at the Naval Base. I then started at the University of West Florida. I had been working part-time at a small radio station in Niceville, FL and I began looking for a radio job in Pensacola, with no luck. School started in September, and I was approached by the man in charge of the Co-Operative Education program about a position at WCOA Radio. I worked part-time at the radio station and went to school full-time. I did this for a semester and then worked full-time at the station and went to school part-time. It was a wonderful program which gave me the opportunity to work in every department of the station except engineering. When I graduated in August 1971, I became a full-time employee in the Sales Department. Our son Matt was born in May 1971. Mary stopped working in April, so at this point I needed to "hit the ground running". The owners of WCOA acquired a station in Bradenton, FL in May of 1972 and the Sales Manager of WCOA was sent to Bradenton manage this new acquisition. He asked me to join him, which I did in September of that year. However, radio sales in Bradenton were not as lucrative as I thought they would be, so I became a stockbroker at AG Edwards in Bradenton in June 1973. Our daughter, Alaina, was born in April of 1975. I loved the stock business and stayed in it until 2005 when I retired and moved to Sun City Center.

When and how did you find out about The Pelican Players?

I started doing shows for the Performing Arts Company in 2010 when a neighbor, Bill Turcot saw me and asked me to audition for a play he was going to direct for Pelican Players. The play was The Odd Couple the Female Version. Jack Parry and I were at the audition at the same time and we both got the two male parts. Later I found out we were the only two men to audition. Since then, I have been in many main stage plays, Readers Theater, Cabaret Singers shows and one Murder Mystery Dinner Theater show.

What is your experience with The Pelican Players and what is your favorite thing about belonging to this group?

Pelican Players has developed into a first-class community theater with excellent officers leading the way and spreading the name along the West Coast of Florida. The total contribution to college scholarships exceeds \$600,000 and reflects their dedication to the performing arts area. The members efforts are reason for the local communities to be proud of the Pelican Players. I feel like I have found a home at the Pelican Players and the friendships that have developed over the years are a great comfort.
