
Quite often you will see them jumping in to help set up and strike our sound equipment. Also, at times they have helped out running sound or sfx.

Are you curious about our audience attendance for our main stage shows? We run 3 main stage productions every year. One in the spring, usually in April; one in the summer, in July and one in the fall, usually in November. In 2022 the spring production was "2 Across" in which 542 people attended the 5 productions. "Kitchen Witches" was the summer run in which 874 people enjoyed the fun at all 4 shows. The 2022 fall show, "Nana's Naughty Knickers", brought 1,086 people to Kings Point Veterans Theater for 5 hilarious runs. This past year, 2023, "The Savannah Sipping Society" brought in 834 patrons to its 4 productions. The summer show, 1,217 people laughed throughout "Drinking Habits" 4 shows. "A Facility for Living", The Pelican Players last show of the 2023 season brought 1,281 patrons to 5 productions at our beautiful theater.



Flamingo Court is made up of three short plays all taking place in an apartment building where several retirees live. *Angelina*, in 104, is a Neil-Simonesque piece where resident Angelina starts to fall for her neighbor Dominic. The only problem is her sick husband is in the other room. Surprises abound as their mutual friend tightropes between being matchmaker and keeping each of their secrets.

Clara, in 204, is the shortest piece and also more somber of the three. Clara is suffering from memory loss and struggles with the idea of being away from her husband, Arthur, in a nursing home.

Harry, in 304, deals with an eighty-nine-year-old gentleman who is trying to celebrate his birthday his way...with a hooker. Upon the arrival of his daughter and son-in-law, who are trying to get every last penny they can out of their father, Harry has to get even more crafty with his stories.

One critic described "Flaming Court" like this; "It's three part 'slice of life' takes place in three different condos and has audiences laughing at the truth they see in what might be their own neighbors - only zanier."
































DO YOU BELIEVE IN GHOSTS?

Theater life is full of superstitions. Last time, I talked about two of the most well known ones, "break a leg" and "don't say Macbeth inside the theater". But I also mentioned spirits. Many believe that all theaters are haunted.

Have you ever heard of the "ghost light"? It's a single bulb left burning whenever a theater is dark. There are those who argue that it's function is to chase away mischievous spirits. Others say it lights the way for the theater ghosts to keep them happy and contented.

The New Amsterdam, one of Broadway's most haunted theaters doesn't use a traditional ghost light. They pretty much leave all the lights on. It appears their resident ghost a former Ziegfeld Follies showgirl named Olive Thomas. Her picture hangs at every entrance and exit to the theater. The cast and crew wish her goodnight when they leave by blowing her a kiss. She has been spotted doing that very thing by those who claim to have seen her.

But the ghost light has actually proven itself a modern theater necessity. It's actually now required for safety purposes to keep people from walking off the edge of the stage.

One superstition that we all cling to which makes us feel better is this "A bad dress rehearsal means a good show". Here are a few others; "Mirrors on stage are bad luck". Actually this is practical, because if a stage light hits the mirror, it can temporarily blind an actor; "Never bring a peacock feather on stage" (because it looks very much like the evil eye); "Whistling backstage is a jinx"; "It's bad luck to give an actor flowers before the end of the show", (giving a performer flowers before a show is considered tempting fate for accidents and mishaps).

So, when all else fails – blame the ghosts!

We worked as a team. Chuck had the creative vision and I was his assistant. We spent 8 happy years designing and building sets in our garage. Chuck acted in shows and I am continuing to work in props.

What is your favorite thing about Pelican Players and living in this community?

When I lost Chuck in 2022, the Pelican Players were a great support to me. I love living in this community where I get to stay active and feel supported in a special place where neighbors become family.

Kathy's family really does love this place. Her daughter and son-in-law live here now and have become Pelican Players too.





AN INTERVIEW WITH BOB DEALMEIDA

in his own words

What is your background?

Originally from Danvers, Massachusetts. We moved here in 2014. We got really tired of the cold weather.



As far as jobs, I've done just about everything. Started as a heavy equipment mechanic, from there owned and operated my own tractor trailer (seven weeks on the road, one week home), went back to turning wrenches after my (at the time) 4-year-old daughter ran behind my wife crying because she did not know who I was. I went to work for a company named Aero Snow. I was assigned to Logan Airport in Boston, MA where my job was to melt all the snow on the runways, taxiways and terminals, so being out in the fields for 2 to 3 days was not uncommon.

For about 5 years I would DJ at several clubs on the North Shore, The Village Green, The Palace, Lansdowne St. Those were the fun years. I didn't make much money but getting 600 plus people dancing felt good and I really enjoyed mixing live music. The show would start at 8 p.m. and end at midnight with no dead air. The music never stopped.

How long have you been with Pelican Players?

I think I've been with Pelican Players for two years. Rick asked my friend Vern Hendricks (from Sun Radio) if he knew of anyone who could do post production work for the Pelican Players Radio Theater. Vern said I can do it and the rest is history.

What is your favorite thing about Pelican Players and living in this community?

My favorite thing, Hmmm... I guess just being back in the theater and working with everyone.

And we love having his expertise. Bob does sound, sound effects, and computer generated music for Main Stage, Readers Theater and The Cabaret Singers. And he works at the SCCCA computer club where he is always willing to help out those of us who are tech challenged. We're certainly lucky he moved to town!

From outside something was banging, banging, and


the something was building, building, and
