On May 4, the metal roof on The Pelican Players' workshop was upgraded to a rolled asphalt roof with ceiling ventilation fan and two solar tubes.



Pelican Players Community Theater presents "Drinking Habits" July 20-22 A door-slamming farce full of belly laughs, plot twists, and rampant paranoia.

Sun City Center, Fla. — "Drinking Habits," a zany farce full of multi-layered, hysterical mistaken identity, is the second main-stage production offered this year by the Pelican Players Community Theater of Sun City Center.

Written by award-winning playwright Tom Smith, "Drinking Habits" is an uproarious comedy about the threat of a small convent closing its doors and two nuns who desperately try to keep them open by secretly making and selling wine. The play ingeniously combines mistaken and assumed identities with well-drawn characters, revealed secrets, and an abundance of high jinks.

"What drew me to the play is that it's a fast-paced farce filled with entrances and exits, mistaken identities, and — at its heart — a good, old-fashioned love story. Actually, two love stories. Well, actually ... three love stories," says Paul Ansell, director of the show. "Oh, and did I mention that it all takes place within the walls of a convent?"

Set in the Convent of the Sisters of Perpetual Sewing, the only actual needlework going on will be the audience when they are in stitches with laughter.

The role of Mother Superior is being played by Shirley Walker; Sister Philamena is played by Kathryn Shea; Sister Augusta by Barbara Boyle; George by Kevin Steinke; Sally by Sandra Foell-Goldman; Paul by Steve Preuss; Sister Mary Catherine by Diane Keyes; and Father Chenille by James Williams.

Julie Ramsey is Assistant Director, and Joy Dunn is Stage Manager.

Audiences will have four opportunities to see the play, starting Thursday, July 20, at 6:30 p.m.; Friday, July 21, at 6:30 p.m.; and Saturday, July 22, at 1:30 and 6:30 p.m. Doors open 30 minutes prior to curtain. Tickets are on sale now at the Kings Point Box Office from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m., Monday-Friday. Evening performances are \$16; \$13 for matinees. Tickets will also be sold at the door for each show.

All performances are at the Kings Point Veterans Theater in the North Clubhouse, 1900 Clubhouse Drive, in Sun City Center.

Founded in 1981, the Pelican Players Community Theater, a 501(c)(3) organization run by volunteers, seeks to promote the dramatic arts by staging productions and educational activities. All profits go toward the Pelican Players Scholarship Fund, handled by Community Foundation Tampa Bay and benefiting local students pursuing the arts.



I believe it is in the actors' best interest to learn these other theater skills. Auditions can be tough and not everyone can get a part. Let's face it, not everyone can or wants to perform. But almost everyone has skills that can be vital to the successful production of a show. Scenery, lighting, sound, costuming, props, make-up, stage design, marketing, and publicity open up many opportunities to be actively involved in a production. DONNA FIORE A well known personality around town, Donna was born and raised in Chicago. She is the middle child of three girls raised by a single mom who worked two jobs to support her girls. Donna said she grew up very responsibly. She attended dancing school at the age of five and went on to a studio of dance and drama at ten. She performed in local shows around Chicago and its suburbs, singing and dancing her way through life. Donna sang in her high school chorus and church choir.

Upon graduation from Regina Dominican High School, she received a full scholarship in Journalism, but turned it down because she was not interested in that field. Instead, she started working for General Mills where she met her husband John, and that as they say, is all she wrote.

She married at nineteen and had her first child at twenty. After taking secretarial courses at a local college, Donna worked temp jobs while raising her six children with John. John worked a number of different jobs, and they eventually moved to Peoria for five years where Donna worked for the Peoria Parks Department teaching drama in a local Catholic school. John decided he didn't like Peoria, so they packed up their then five children (the sixth was born in Florida) and moved to Tampa in 1975 where her brother-in-law owned an ice cream store. They joined forces and eventually opened a second store. During all this time, Donna pursued her love of theater and singing, performing in many local shows and of course singing in the church choir. She spent quality time with her kids by bringing them to her rehearsals.

Throughout many struggles in her life, Donna has always found her own special peace through singing and acting. She has also had private lessons in voice, classical piano, music theory and choir directing.

Whew! I'm tired just thinking about all that. They lived in Tampa for 37 years and then discovered Sun City Center through a cousin of John' who lived there. Donna was unsure at first about moving to a senior town, but found out what an active community it was, and it had activities for both of them. John was able to play pickle ball for a time, but a devastating heart attack left him very ill. Donna became a caretaker, but eventually he needed care in a skilled facility and very sadly passed away in April of 2016. That July, she opened her restaurant "Fiore's" with her son Matt as chef and various children and grandchildren working alongside them. Unfortunately, the economy and inflation worked against them and they closed in 2022. But throughout, Donna remained active in Pelican Players. She has been an active member since 2012. She is also a Cantor for Our Lady of Guadaloupe Catholic Church. She is a devoted mother and grandmother of 17, and great grandmother of 5. Performing for Pelican Players is where she finds her tranquil outlet from a busy life. Donna's life philosophy can be summed up in these words, "Don't let your past dictate your future."

JOHN FOSTER John is one of our oldest and longest lifetime members. He was born in Rye, New York 90 years ago and currently resides in Freedom Plaza. Shortly after his birth, his family moved to Darien, Connecticut where he grew up and graduated from Loomis Prep School in 1951. He received a scholarship from American Field Service to study in France. He spent that summer in France staying with three different families and loved the experience. He majored in French at Yale University and became, what else.... A French teacher. He also did a stint in the Air Force where he flew B-47s for the Strategic Air Command.

John taught at the Choate School in Connecticut where he eventually became head of the French Department. His love of Bridge led him to a table where he met his lovely wife, Lorraine. They married in 1960 and raised a son and daughter. In 1969, they moved to Troy, New York where John became head of the Language Department at the Emma Willard School, the oldest girls school in the country. This is where he got a real taste for the theater. He was Director of their Christmas pageants and always played the father figure in their plays. John and Lorraine retired in 1990 and moved to Sun City Center because it had the three things he loved the most (aside from Lorraine); golf, Bridge, and a community theater. He became a certified Bridge teacher in 1992 and was runner-up for Bridge Teacher of the Year by the nationwide Duplicate Bridge Association.

John became a member of The Pelican Players in 1991 and was President of the Board of Directors from 1997-2003. He was the editor of the Pelican Perch, our original newsletter. John is also responsible for obtaining our storage building outside the theater and has headed several Directors workshops. When Pelican Players originally started The Follies, back in the 90's, John was an MC and was responsible for increasing the shows from 2 to 3 performances (2 evenings and a matinee) to bring in more revenue for scholarships. John started publicity enhancement for productions with the help of Diane Borini who managed the ticket office for many years. This involved fliers and poster displays outside the ticket office. In addition to these accomplishments, John is a published poet. He started out by entering a contest at the Hillsborough County Library called Wit-Lit in 2007. He educated himself in all forms of poetry and has written four poetry collection books. His latest book, "A Gesture of Words" is a guide to 33 poetry forms from around the world and has been endorsed by the Poet Laureate of Florida. He currently is the custodian of the poetry display at Freedom Plaza called The Poet Tree.

A few months ago, his wife, Lorraine passed away after 63 years of marriage. John still maintains a wonderful outlook on life and keeps busy. His daughter recently threw him a 90th Birthday bash at Freedom Plaza where they had a wonderful time. John is a humorous and delightful man. To me, he will always be the Poet Laureate of Sun City Center.
